Summary of the Course

The purpose of this course is to provide you with an opportunity to learn how to prepare a research proposal in education. This course reviews the steps in the research process and considers the elements, structure and organisation, and writing style of research proposals in education. It will enable you to plan educational research and outline the steps using appropriate structure and organisation and writing style for a research proposal in education. It will assist you with preparing your proposal for confirmation as well as your oral presentation.

During this Term, you will work primarily with your supervisors to prepare for your confirmation in Term 3. Confirmation consists of presentation of your research proposal to your confirmation panel together with an oral presentation on your project.

Note: This course is only available to EdPrDoc students.

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Identify and explain the steps in the research process.
- 2. Recognise and address the practical considerations in a research proposal for a research project in education
- 3. Identify and explain the elements, structure, organisation, and writing style of a research proposal in education.

Teaching Strategies

Rationale: The course provides students with information and support in planning educational research, specifically the research proposal for their higher degree resarch projects.

Teaching strategies: A combination of independent work, teacher instruction and student led interactive sessions will be used throughout the course.

Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Plagiarism is using the words or ideas of others and presenting them as your own. It can take many forms, from deliberate cheating to accidentally copying from a source without acknowledgement.

UNSW groups plagiarism into the following categories:

Copying: Using the same or very similar words to the original text or idea without acknowledging the source or using quotation marks. This includes copying materials, ideas or concepts from a book, article, report or other written document, presentation, composition, artwork, design, drawing, circuitry, computer program or software, website, internet, other electronic resource, or another person's assignment without appropriate acknowledgement.

Inappropriate paraphrasing: Changing a few words and phrases while mostly retaining the original information, structure and/or progression of ideas of the original without acknowledgement. This also applies in presentations where someone paraphrases another's ideas or words without credit and to piecing together quotes and paraphrases into a new whole, without appropriate referencing.

Collusion: Working with others but passing off the work as a person's individual work. Collusion also includes providing your work to another student for the purpose of them plagiarising, paying another person to perform an academic task, stealing or acquiring another person's academic work and copying it, offering to complete another person's work or seeking payment for completing academic work.

Inappropriate citation: Citing sources which have not been read, without acknowledging the "secondary" source from which knowledge of them has been obtained.

Duplication ("self-plagiarism"): Submitting your own work, in whole or in part, where it has previously been prepared or submitted for another assessment or course at UNSW or another university.

Correct referencing practices

The <u>UNSW Academic Skills support</u> offers resources and individual consultations. Students are also reminded that careful time management is an important part of study. One of the identified causes of plagiarism is poor time management. Students should allow sufficient time for research, drafting and proper referencing of sources in preparing all assessment items.

UNSW Library has the ELISE tool available to assist you with your study at UNSW. ELISE is designed to introduce new students to studying at UNSW but it can also be a great refresher during your study. Completing the ELISE tutorial and quiz will enable you to:
